### Worthy Brothers;

For those who were unable to attend the installation, here is an extract of my comments:

“Our new State Deputy Edgar Haynes’ theme for his term is Living our Faith. We have been living this theme and doing this is what has made us a great council. When we support the St Vincent de Paul Society, we help feed the poor and we have helped St Vincent de Paul to keep the poor warm in the winter by raising money to support the fuel assistance program. We help take care of the mentally handicapped through the Tootsie Roll drive and support of the John Archer festival. This council provided assistance to abused women and children when we conducted our cell phone collection. These cell phones were either repaired and issued to them so they had a way to call for help in an emergency or the phones’ precious metal was recycled with the funds raised used to support the shelters. We helped improve Habitat for Humanity’s ability to build housing for needy families when we assisted them in the purchase of a new equipment trailer they needed to get equipment to their building site. The council continually helps several research efforts, such the Parkinson’s Disease, Juvenile Diabetes, and Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, to find a cure and save lives. We help strengthen the faith of our youth through the scholarship funds we provide the Religious Education program here and the financial support we provide our sister parish, Mary Our Queen, in Haiti. These are just a few of the ways as Knights that we live our faith.

There are two other things we need to strive to attain this year. We are in striking distance of reaching the membership level to be a Division A council. We start the year with 209 brothers, a mere 16 members from have the council reach 225 and Division A. Our goal is to reach and surpass this level. To do this we all need to get out there and recruit new members. Last year, we recruited over 20 new members, so I believe we should not have any problems getting the 16 we need if we all do our part.

A key thing we have to keep in mind is that reaching that level is not enough. We need to develop programs and activities that will engage all of our members. One of the things we need to be aware of is the danger that large organizations can fall into the trap of only doing programs that appeal to a small percentage of their membership. These organizations may have a large number of brothers but only a very small group that participate in activities, and this small group gets burned out.

We need to look for new and exciting programs and activities, activities that will engage our membership to get actively participating. If we can develop programs that fulfill the need brothers have to serve their community and have fun at the same time, we will have a council that individuals will want to belong to. This will then encourage even more brothers to look at us and what we do.... I hope that with your prayers and support, we will continue to be an active, vibrant council. One that will make other Catholic men say, “I want to be a Knight of Columbus”

## Associate Chaplain's Message

### DEACONS CORNER

Last month we focused on the community and our efforts to build a community of people who could come together and share themselves with the other people who come to church.

While the theory and ideal, as well as efforts on the parish level like we mentioned last month, promote the sense of belonging within the church, some Catholics today still fail to feel that they do belong to a welcoming, caring, community oriented church.

This is probably due to a few things that we inherited from past generations. If you go back to the year 1570 when the ritual book for Mass was published, it continued on the practice of a clergy dominated worship service that originated in the middle ages. Even though the lay people were presumed to be present at the liturgy, it was the priest who performed almost every function. The role of the people in the pews was to simply watch, listen, believe and pray. They were only observers to what was going on at

the Mass. I think that these years of silence may have created a comfortable habit for most people. Sunday worship became a time for individual silent prayer and adoration, even while surrounded by other people.

Beginning in the early 1900's, the Church officially encouraged congregational singing, and a little more active participation at many of the liturgical functions. As you can imagine, many of the lay people found this a little bit foreign to their customs. I would also imagine that many became uncomfortable or even resisted leaving their more privatized practice during worship. Mass to many was strictly a vertical element between them and God.

But if we go back to the Gospel scriptures which Jesus many times emphasized, we always hear Jesus telling us about not only the vertical element but also the horizontal element with our neighbor. Before Vatican II, Catholic worship stressed

the vertical element; and after Vatican II, Catholic worship emphasized the horizontal or communal element. It's very important that we have a proper awareness and maintain a correct balance.

I think we all realize that as we come to Mass we all struggle with our weaknesses and our inclination toward thinking about just ourselves. We come preoccupied with our own world and our own concerns and find it difficult to be open to those around us. Perhaps we find it more comfortable sitting in the back of church and not close to anybody else. We want to pray in silence & not sing with others and may even resist offering a sign of peace. There has been a tremendous growth in the community dimension and parish life but for all the reasons we have just mentioned it's an ongoing challenge. We can only pray that we can meet that challenge and pass on to the next generation our community spirit
